How come others make it and you want to be left out. Of course it is a matter of prioritizing and everything comes at a cost. A recent example is when I was invited to Rath Yatra, where my wife chose some household shopping over it. Now I realise that household chores are never ending, for someone living abroad opportunities like these are few and far in between so you should take them when it comes.

People: Finding company of like-minded people to collaborate in cultural practices can be a difficult task from experience. People have competing priorities and different levels of commitment towards their culture. **Rishi Khandelwal** recollects that there have been few instances where my family has tried to organize a Diwali meet and people were not available at the time. But the only solution is many times you will have to go off on your own and sometimes perhaps solo to maintain your culture. Tradition waits for no one and either you are in or out.

Resources: For many people, maintaining traditional value is an expensive affair. They feel that it can be a financial burden especially in difficult times.
