Other RN job functions include leadership, research, performing diagnostic tests and analyzing results, operating medical equipment, administering medications, recording patients' symptoms and medical histories, and assisting with patient rehabilitation and follow-up.

A Certified Critical Care Nurse (CCCN) is trained to use their skills and experience to care for patients who are critically ill and at high risk for life-threatening health problems. They may also care for pre- and post-operative patients. To do the job properly, a CCCN must have the ability to think and work quickly in stressful conditions and stay alert after many hours of intensive work.
