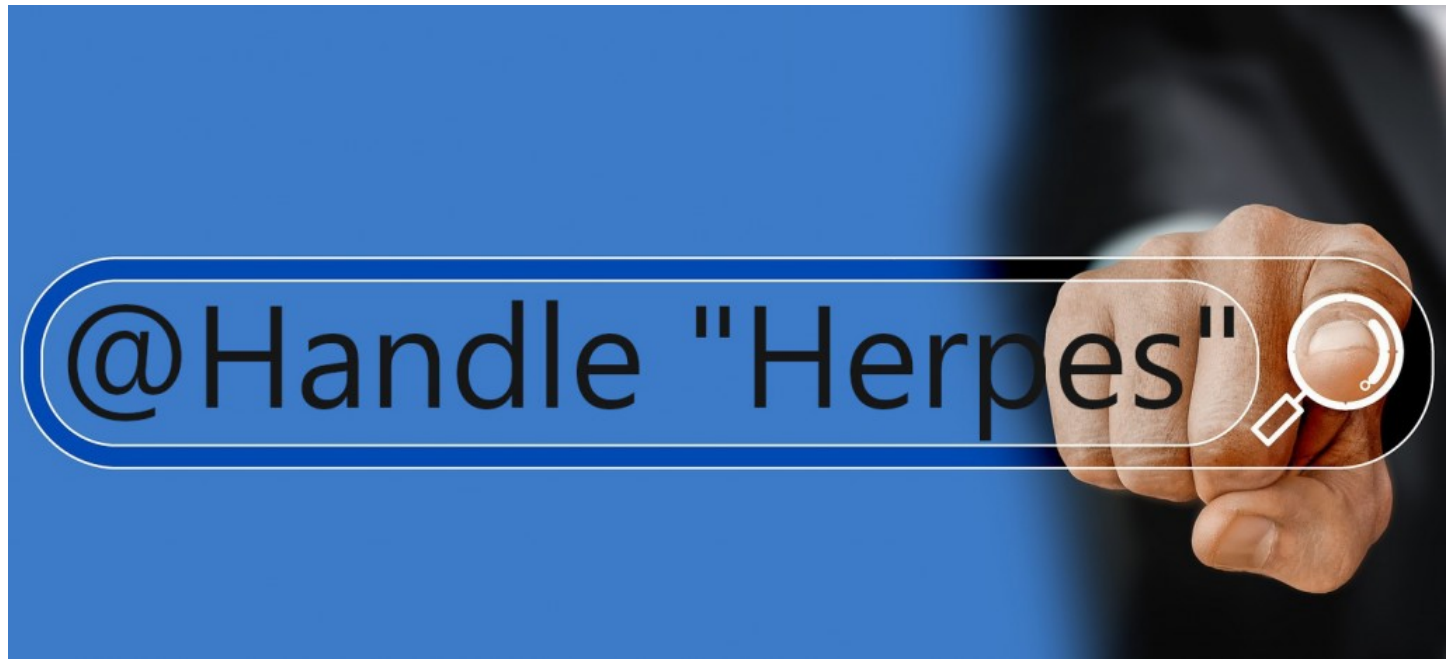


STD Surveillance Enters the Social Media Age

New social monitoring tools are searching the internet for indications that people have sexually transmitted diseases and archiving their statements.



Oregon, Portland, May 19, 2021 (Issuewire.com) - Sexually transmitted disease (STD) surveillance has entered the social media age with new social monitoring tools keeping an eye out for signs of STD infections. STDMonitor.com uses automated means to search social media pages and other websites for information indicating that people have STDs.

[Social monitoring](#) from STD Monitor works by searching recent social media posts on websites including Twitter, Instagram, and Facebook for statements indicating that someone is admitting to having an STD or accusing someone else of having an STD. People often make embarrassing admission online and take them down hoping no one noticed. If STD Monitor notices the post is copied and displayed for future reference. The same is true when people expose embarrassing truths about their associates during heats of passion. Then they think twice about it and take it down. In the past one might be able to wipe proof of their words from the internet entirely once mainstream search engines no longer index their original post, but not anymore. Now people can search STD Monitor to find out if their special someone has ever admitted having or been accused of having an STD on social media.

STD Monitor also watches websites known for soliciting allegations that people have STDs. Cheating reporting sites and [STD registries](#). When someone reports their ex to a cheaters website it is not uncommon for them to also be accused of having STDs. There are also entire websites dedicated to exposing dishonest people with STDs so that future partners can be warned. Those sites are usually marketed as STD registries. STD Monitor aggregates report from those types of websites.

STD Monitor also features a [news aggregator](#) that brings you the latest headlines from leading media outlets covering STD outbreaks, treatment, prevention, and statistics. Unlike most sources, STD Monitor has not disabled its commenting features.

Users are encouraged to post comments about anything the STD Monitor documents. That feature is intended to help people clear the air in cases of misinformation. STD Monitor knows that there are always two sides to every story and believes that both sides should be heard.
