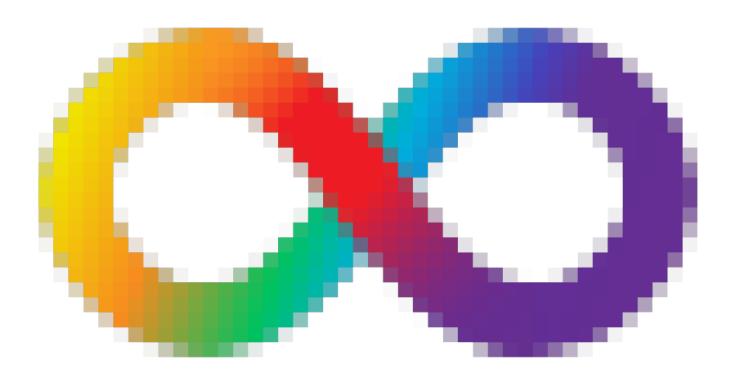

"Employers need to rethink their recruiting, interviewing, onboarding, and training strategies," said Sheila Jordan, owner and founder of workability.one. "It's no longer about jobs being filled by the right people -- it's about adjusting the jobs, work hours, and goals to meet the needs of workers. It is a neurodiverse world, and a one-size-fits-all approach no longer works."

Characteristics and skills common among the neurodiverse -- pattern-seeking and recognition, singular focus on a specific task until its completion, honest and direct communication -- are desirable attributes for new employees. "Neurodiversity can be an important competitive advantage," Jordan added.

With renewed effort applied toward redesigning how companies recruit, interview, onboard, train, and coach neurodiverse workers, employers can tap into the estimated 5,437,988 (2.21%) adults in the United States who have ASD
