Some people wonder, "Why do you need to colour grade at all? Why doesn't the camera just appear

flawless when you're shooting with it?"

There are two major causes for this. The first is a technical one. You want a camera that exposes as much information as possible. To make it appear beautiful, you'll have to give up part of that information in order to direct the eye to where you want it to go. You want to wait as long as possible in the process before discarding that information, so cameras focus on exposing as much latitude as possible.

The second reason for grading is for artistic purposes. It turns out that not everyone agrees on the meaning of "looking good," and that term varies based on the project.

Your thriller film might need less colour and a cooler aesthetic, whilst your romantic comedy might need more saturation and a warmer style.

The camera has no idea what it's capturing because there is no "genre" setting in the menu with options for rom-com and horror. As a result, we colour grade the images to verify that they are appropriate for the story being told in each scenario.
