I've had the opportunity to apply for jobs at big companies that I wouldn't have had access to if I wasn't an IAPWE member.

Pitching Opportunities

If you're a member of the IAPWE, you will also have access to pitching opportunities for their blog. If you propose a topic to IAPWE and they like it, they may allow you to write an article for them. This is a great way to get your name out there and make some extra money.

From my experience, they do accept topic pitches. I didn't have to pitch two or three topics to find out. I just proposed one topic and forgot about it. Then, to my surprise, I received an email from them asking me to send a Paypal invoice because my topic was approved.

Content Writing Opportunity

Apart from pitching topics and job boards, IAPWE also offers content writing opportunities. You can pick and write about various topics from their site, with word counts ranging from 300 to 500 words.

With this, you get to identify the topic you want to write about and follow the strict guidelines to submit your topic. You'll then have to wait up to 10 business days for the editorial team to approve your topic. Well, at least that's what they say!

But do writers get paid for the topics they write about? Don't be so sure about this because you won't be able to claim the topic after all. All you have to do is write the article, submit it and wait for the approval. There's a good chance that another writer will write the same topic and submit it before you get the chance. There are a lot of red flags about this part, but I can't say much because I only did one topic as a trial and didn't receive any feedback.

What I Don't Like About IAPWE

While IAPWE seems like a good platform to make money, there are a few things that could be improved.

Very Strict Editorial Standards

While the website claims to offer writing opportunities for its members with very good pay, it's clear that you'll have to sweat it out. They have very strict editorial standards, and if your article doesn't meet these standards, it will be rejected. This means you'll have to write very high-quality articles. Otherwise, you won't get paid for the work you do.

The Job Board Can Be Shoddy

The requirements for some of their job postings can be quite strict. You need to have a certain level of experience and qualifications before applying for some jobs. This can make it difficult for new writers or editors to get started. At times you may not be able to find jobs that you're qualified to do because some of them require a lot of experience.

Not to mention they may repeat the job posts that they've already posted several times. I understand that the company might still be hiring for those positions, but this can be frustrating when trying to find new opportunities. It's even worse because you're paying to see these job posts.

You Have to Pay to See the Job Board

Accessing the job board for the IAPWE website is not free. You need to pay a monthly subscription fee

or an annual membership fee if you want to access their job board. This is a bit pricey compared to other websites which offer the same service for free.

You will only be able to access the IAPWE resources if you pay for the membership. What's even worse of that the website doesn't have any transparency regarding the cost of the subscription.

There's no information online on whether you'll be charged for membership; you only find out once you join. What's even worse, opting out once you've paid for the subscription is also not easy. So, you'll either deal with it or just blog your credit card so you won't be charged again.

The Payment Process Is Not Clear

Another issue I have with IAPWE is the payment process. It's not clearly stated how and when you'll get paid after submitting an article. The website only says that they pay through Freelancer.com.

From what I understand, Freelancer is not an issue payment platform, which means you'll have to create an account on their website to receive payments. Why won't they pay their writers using PayPal just as they pay for other services, such as topic proposals? What if you want to avoid creating a Freelancer account? Does it mean you won't get paid for the articles you write for the website?

Cancelling Your Subscription May Not Be Easy

Other [IAPWE](#) users claim that they can't cancel their subscriptions. The website requires you to fill a lengthy form to cancel the subscription. This means that once you've paid for the subscription, you might not be able to get your money back even if you want to leave the website.

But some users say you can cancel through PayPal by requesting a refund. This can be another tiring process because cancelling a subscription only needs to be a click away. This is something the website should look into and fix.

Negative Reviews

Truth be told, IAPWE doesn't have a good online reputation. There are way too many negative reviews from disgruntled members who have had a bad experience with the website. Most of the complaints are legit, and I think the organization should do something to address them.

Consider the fact that everything is now done online, and many people check the reviews before they join a platform. With a bad online reputation, I don't think IAPWE will attract more members to join. And even a few of us who have some good things to say about the platform might even give up because of the negative reviews.

Is IAPWE a Scam?

From my experience being a member of IAPWE, it's not perfect, but also not a scam. It has its pros and cons, just like any other service. It provides content writing jobs with decent pay if you can meet their editorial standards.

Their job board offers many writers a chance to apply for jobs in some renowned companies. You'll even get access to resources such as topic proposals and article templates that can help you produce high-quality content for your clients. There are three main reasons that prove IAPWE is not a scam.

1. They Have an Active Website

The IAPWE website has been active since 2015, and they have been providing content writing jobs ever since. They have a contact page where you can get in touch with their customer service team, and they answer any questions that you may have about the website.

Their job board is also updated regularly so that new opportunities are always available to writers who want to join their platform. This shows that the website is still active and they are not running a scam.

2. They Pay Writers for Topic Proposals

I don't know about the payments for working on the topics they post, but I have been paid for proposing a topic. I can confidently say that IAPWE does pay its writers for the topics they propose. This proves that IAPWE is not a scam, and they do have to pay for gigs available to those who join their platform.

3. Their Social Media Accounts are Active

I have browsed through the Facebook and LinkedIn accounts of IAPWE, and they are regularly updated. This means that the website is active, and its support team responds to inquiries from its members on social media. This shows that the company is legitimate and not a scam.

Overall, IAPWE is a legit platform with some flaws when it comes to job posting, subscription cancellation, and pricing. However, this doesn't make it a scam. It's still a legitimate website that provides good opportunities to writers who wish to freelance and earn some extra income. Just keep in mind the cons mentioned above before you decide to join IAPWE and start writing for them.
