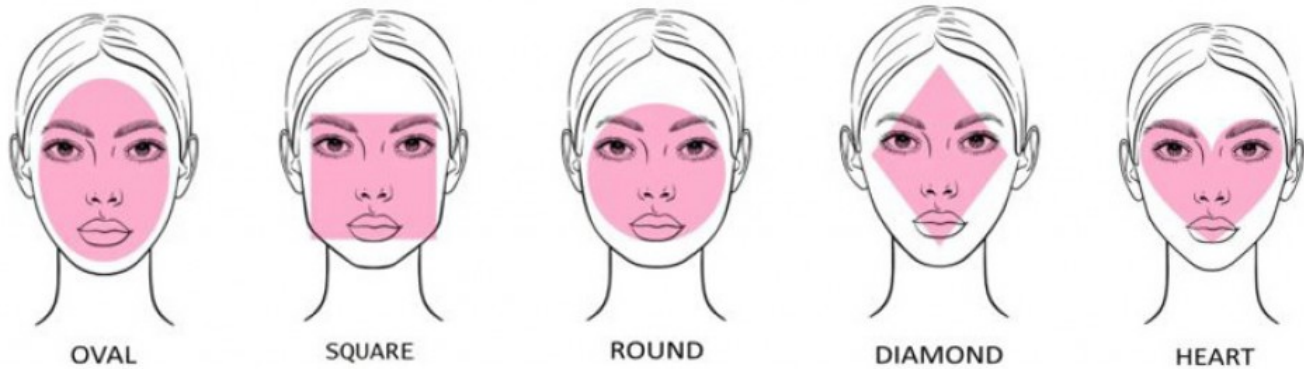

Base face shape

1. Oval face shape

Oval face shapes can be worn with a variety of frame styles. Such as:

Rectangle eyeglasses: These frames add structure and contour to an oval face, accentuating its natural symmetry.

Round frame glasses: Round frames soften the angles of an oval face and add a touch of vintage charm.

2. Round face shape

A round face is characterized by soft curves without strong edges and corners. Choose a frame style that adds angles and elongates your face. Like:

[Rectangle glasses](#): Angular frames can create the illusion of a longer face and balance the roundness.

Square glasses: Angular square frames contrast sharply with the soft curves of a round face, adding structure and dimension to the face.

3. Square face shape

A square face is characterized by a jaw angle and a prominent forehead. The goal is to soften the edges and add some curves to create balance. Like:

Round glasses: Round frames can soften the strong features of a square face and add a touch of softness.

: Oval frames with soft curves balance out the rectangular features of a square face for a more harmonious look.

4. Heart-shaped face

A heart-shaped face is characterized by a wider forehead and a narrower jaw.

The goal is to balance the shape of the face by adding width to the lower half of the face. Like:

: Round frames with soft curves can add width to the lower half of the face, creating a more balanced look.

Frames with wider bottoms: Such as aviator or butterfly frames, can create a visually balanced effect.

5. Diamond face shape

The diamond-shaped face shape is characterized by a narrow forehead and jaw and wide cheekbones.

The goal is to soften the edges and corners and accentuate the cheekbones. Like:

Oval glasses: Oval frames can tone down the edges and create a more balanced look by accentuating the cheekbones.

[Cat-eye glasses](#): Cat-eye frames draw attention to the eyes and cheekbones, enhancing the overall symmetry of a diamond-shaped face.

Based on skin tone

Skin tone is more important than hair color, more decisive than eye color, and sets the tone for high-fashion frames. Choose the shade closest to your skin tone:

1. Warm Skin Tone

If you have yellow, bronze, or golden skin, you have a warm skin tone.

Warm skin tones are suited for frame colors that complement each other, such as light tortoise, gold, honey, beige, olive green, and brown tones color frames glasses

Avoid contrasting colors such as bright pink, white, black, and blue frame glasses.

2. Neutral Skin Tone

Neutral skin tones usually have a natural mix of warm and cool tones. Neutral undertones have textures of blue-green or a combination of blue and green. A wide range of frame colors is available, such as brown, beige, taupe, tortoiseshell, transparent or translucent, and other soft frame colors.

3. Cool Skin Tones

If your skin has pink or blue undertones, you have a cool skin tone. Choose silver, black, blue, gray, dark tortoiseshell, pink, purple, and fuchsia frames for cool skin tones.

Avoid colors that dull you, such as yellows, bright oranges, and dark browns, as they don't work well with your skin tone and don't enhance your facial features.

Based on hair color

1. Black hair

Black hair can be paired with bold and contrasting colors such as red, deep purple, or bright blue for a vibrant, eye-catching look.

2. White or gray hair

If you have white or gray hair, a bright frame color, such as red or turquoise, can brighten your face and look great.

3. Red hair

Warm brown, tortoise, dark red, olive green, and other earthy colors of frames can complement red hair and create a harmonious and natural look. Avoid red frames. If you prefer a bolder look, contrasting frames such as black or dark purple will contrast well with red hair.

4. Auburn hair

If you have russet hair, [tortoiseshell frames](#) will look great. Also, try using warm and earthy-colored frames.

5. Brown hair

Contrasting frames in dark colors such as black, dark brown, or dark tortoise can make brown hair look more striking and defined. If you have warm brown hair, consider warm frames such as amber, caramel, or tortoiseshell to complement your hair color and add warmth to your overall look.

6. Blonde hair

If you have warm blonde hair, consider frames in warm tones such as gold, copper, or tortoiseshell. These colors will accent your hair color and create a coherent look.

If you have platinum blonde or light blonde hair, frames in lighter colors like pink, light gray, white, or translucent will complement your hair color without making it look too strong.

Based on eye color

Gamers can choose from a wide range of stylish frames to enhance their gaming experience.

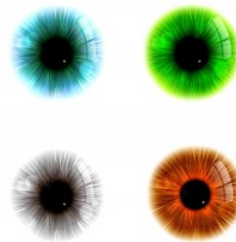
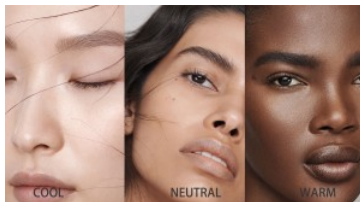
