- **Vertical Impaction**: The tooth is correctly positioned but hasn't fully erupted through the gum line
- Horizontal Impaction: The tooth is lying horizontally and cannot break through the gum.
- **Distal Impaction**: The tooth is angled backward, towards the back of the mouth.
