FOWPAL's Peace Bell Rings to Awaken Conscience

World Conference of Mayors Shares Heartfelt Wishes for Children's Future

Dr. Hong, Tao-Tze, president of FOWPAL and leader of Tai Ji Men, emphasized in his speech that children are the future and hold the key to a sustainable world. He stressed the importance of safeguarding children's safety and health, ensuring they grow up in a positive environment, and helping them develop correct values. Dr. Hong highlighted that understanding and practicing love and peace is a shared responsibility. He pointed out that the foundation for a sustainable future and peace lies in the guidance of conscience. When individuals reflect honestly and calmly, conscience leads them to make wise and just decisions, even in challenging situations. By practicing daily self-reflection, Dr. Hong noted, people can unlock their potential and contribute to a world filled with greater love and peace.

New York State Senator Cordell Cleare rang the Bell of World Peace and Love and stated, "It is my wish that all people receive justice and reparations for all harms and damages suffered. Without reparations, there is no justice. Without justice, there is no peace."

She shared her reflections on the powerful symbolism of the Bell of World Peace and Love: "It was really an incredible experience. I didn't know what to expect, but as I stood there, the bell sounded so clear, and in that bell, it's as clear as my mission, it's as clear as the thoughts that I have towards peace." She said she felt very honored to be a bell ringer.

Jack Tawil, Chairman and CEO of Medpod, rang the Bell and wished for "high quality healthcare access and reduction of health disparities for all." He hopes to bring excellence in medical services to the world and achieve peace around the world through healthcare and healthy people.

Former U.S. Congressman Charles B. Rangel, who is in his 90s, rang the Bell of World Peace and Love and wished for world peace.

Voza Rivers, Chairman and Co-founder of the Harlem Arts Alliance, rang the Bell and expressed his wish for an end to all wars and for peace to prevail across the world. He said, "This ceremony was very, very special for me, and ringing the Bell just added and made me aware of the important work that I'm doing because I am a social justice advocate. I felt that peace and the message of peace and love are so special to me personally because the work that I do is around 'no more wars,' 'no more violence,' peace, love."

Anthony Thomas Aquinas Carmona, former President of Trinidad and Tobago, shared insightful thoughts: "We live in a society where ethical conduct suffers at the altar of a premature law where legitimacy stretches and even compromises moral conduct expected in and of institutional governance. And this is why it is so important that you recognize your inner and outer worth as NGOs."

At the end of the event, young members of FOWPAL delivered a captivating performance titled "We Can Change the World." The audience joined in by waving their hands in time with the music, creating a warm and moving atmosphere. The collective call for the power of change energized the crowd. It was a moment not only of musical harmony but also of heartfelt connection, uniting the hope and actions of everyone present in the shared goal of promoting love and peace.
