Clairva's platform works directly with creators, production studios, content owners, and archives to curate and license video libraries that can be transformed into machine-learning-ready datasets. Each dataset is enriched with metadata, multimodal alignment (video, audio, text), and clear usage rights, enabling safe deployment in high-stakes use cases such as sovereign AI, brand-generated content, and enterprise copilots.

The company's early access program, already live in select markets, is onboarding creators, enterprise partners, and public sector institutions. Clairva's goal is to enable both frontier and fine-tuned AI models that reflect the visual, cultural, and linguistic realities of Asia.

"The future of AI requires diverse and defensible data. Clairva provides exactly that, with regionally relevant content and compliance built in," said **Dushyant Verma**, Clairva co-founder. "Our datasets not only power better models but reduce risk for developers and regulators alike."

As part of its go-to-market strategy, Clairva will prioritize collaborations with content creators across India, Indonesia, the Philippines, the UAE, and Singapore. It will also partner with academic institutions, media networks, and government-backed AI initiatives looking to build more representative foundation video generation models.

With global AI companies facing increasing legal scrutiny over training data and sovereign governments accelerating national LLM projects, Clairva sees a clear opportunity to become the default infrastructure layer for video datasets in the Global South.
