What began as a heartfelt mission has since grown into a movement of compassion, raising over \$150,000 to provide essential aid, resources, and a community of strength for the families of those who dedicate their lives to protecting others.

A Foundation Born From Service

The name Class 12/10/12 Foundation carries weight and meaning. December 10, 2012 marked a turning point, the day Andrew Bartnikowski and his firefighter class graduated from training, stepping fully into the dangerous, demanding, and rewarding world of fire service. That date became more than a milestone, it became a promise.

"Every time a firefighter suits up, they know the risks," Bartnikowski said. "But their families carry those risks too. They live with uncertainty, and when the unthinkable happens, they are left with unimaginable loss. That is why we started this foundation, so they would never feel alone."

From the outset, Bartnikowski and his team envisioned the foundation as a resource for immediate financial assistance and long term healing. Over the past decade, the foundation has steadily expanded its reach, providing scholarships, grief counseling resources, funeral cost support, and wellness programs aimed at suicide prevention within the fire service community.

Addressing a Silent Crisis

Firefighters are celebrated as heroes, but few outside the service understand the depth of sacrifice the role demands. Beyond smoke and flames, firefighters are often first on the scene in traumatic emergencies, carrying the weight of tragedy long after the sirens fade.

Studies show that firefighters face a higher risk of suicide than the general population, with mental health struggles frequently compounded by a culture that values toughness and silence over vulnerability. For families, the impact of these invisible wounds is profound.

The Class 12/10/12 Foundation was created to confront this reality head on. Through its programming, the foundation supports families after tragedies and also works to prevent tragedies by promoting awareness, mental health resources, and peer support initiatives.

"Too many firefighter families are blindsided by the toll this profession takes," Bartnikowski explained. "We cannot stop every fire, but we can give families the tools and the help they need to recover and move forward."

Over \$150,000 Raised and Counting

Since its inception, the Class 12/10/12 Foundation has raised over **\$150,000** through community fundraising events, private donations, and corporate partnerships. Every dollar has gone toward directly impacting the lives of firefighter families.

Some of the foundation's achievements include:

- Emergency Financial Assistance for families navigating sudden loss or severe injury.
- Scholarship Programs for children of fallen firefighters to continue their education.
- **Wellness and Resilience Programs** addressing suicide prevention and mental health stigma within fire departments.
- **Community Events** such as annual memorial runs, silent auctions, and firehouse family days to raise awareness and foster solidarity.

Each contribution tells a story of generosity and gratitude. Communities have rallied behind the foundation, recognizing that when they support firefighters' families, they honor the sacrifices of those who run toward danger when everyone else runs away.
