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believes it is time to rethink what success truly means. After more than two decades of building and leading companies, Regina is encouraging business leaders to look beyond financial gain and focus on purpose, balance, and lasting impact.

For much of his career, Regina has watched entrepreneurs chase what he calls "the illusion of finish lines." He says too many people see success as a destination, a revenue goal, or a public milestone. "We have been taught to treat success like a scoreboard," says Regina. "The people I admire most are the ones who have learned to define winning on their own terms."

This belief came from years of experience. Before becoming an entrepreneur, Regina worked in senior roles with international firms. For Regina, the first step in that process is clarity of purpose. Entrepreneurs, he says, must begin with a clear understanding of why they are building something. He believes the best companies are not just profitable but also meaningful. "When you know your purpose, decisions become simple," he says. "You lead with conviction instead of competition."

He also emphasizes sustainability in every sense. "You cannot build something that lasts if you are exhausted," says Regina. "Real leaders protect their focus and energy. They know that strength comes from balance."

As a board member for several growing companies, Regina teaches founders to think long term. He often reminds them that growth must move in step with people and systems. "Fast growth can create cracks," he says. "Patience builds stronger foundations."

Noah Smith Regina often draws lessons from running. He is an active marathoner and sees clear links between endurance sports and business. "In running, you do not sprint at the start," he says. "You respect the distance. Success in business works the same way. If you rush, you lose direction."

He also believes that failure is an essential part of progress. "Failure is not the opposite of success," says Regina. "It gives you the data you need to improve. Every setback is a lesson if you are willing to listen."

Looking ahead, Regina believes adaptability and honesty will define outstanding leadership. "People are tired of empty ambition," he says. "They want leaders who stand for something real and build with integrity."

His advice to entrepreneurs is simple. "Create something that matters, even if it takes longer," he says. "Measure success by how well it aligns with your values, not by how loudly others applaud. When your work reflects who you are, you have already succeeded."
