The company emphasizes that spring and early summer scheduling fills quickly, particularly in rural areas where onsite wastewater systems are essential for residential development.

For property owners outside municipal sewer access, proactive septic planning can help prevent delays and provide more flexibility in system design and installation timing.

Crush Excavation works with homeowners to evaluate site conditions early, coordinate required approvals, and prepare projects before seasonal backlogs tighten timelines.
