The technical execution of these high-fashion sessions requires a deep understanding of light and shadow, a skill set Purdie has honed over years of working with international brands. Each session uses sophisticated lighting rigs that can be deployed on-site, enabling studio-quality lighting even in the middle of the desert or on a bustling city street. This allows the studio to create "hero shots" that emphasize the subject's features and wardrobe while maintaining a beautifully blurred, cinematic background.
