

Kiahuna Sunrise Cafe Hawaii Encourages Visitors to Experience Kaua'i Beyond Resorts

The Po'ipū breakfast cafe is highlighting the value of slower travel, local businesses, and community-centered experiences across Kaua'i.



Kalaheo, Hawaii Jun 11, 2026 ([Issuewire.com](https://www.issuewire.com)) - Kiahuna Sunrise Cafe Hawaii is encouraging travelers to experience a different side of Kaua'i by spending more time exploring local businesses, historic spaces, and community-centered destinations outside traditional resort settings.

Located within the historic Kiahuna Plantation in Po'ipū, the breakfast and brunch cafe has become part of a growing conversation around slower travel and more locally connected visitor experiences on the island's South Shore.

"We meet people every morning who tell us they spent most of their first trip inside a resort," says Kirk Coult of Kiahuna Sunrise Cafe, Hawaii. "Then they come back another year, start exploring local spots, and suddenly the island feels completely different to them."

The conversation reflects a broader trend in tourism. According to research from Booking.com, more

than 70% of travelers say they want experiences that feel more connected to local culture and community. Hawaii has seen similar shifts as visitors increasingly search for smaller businesses, local food experiences, and neighborhood gathering spaces.

Moving Beyond the Resort Bubble

Kaua'i remains one of Hawaii's most visited islands, attracting more than 1.3 million visitors annually according to the Hawaii Tourism Authority. While resorts continue to play a major role in the visitor economy, local business owners say many travelers are now seeking more personal, less isolated experiences.

Kiahuna Sunrise Cafe Hawaii is housed in a restored plantation-era building, surrounded by gardens, koi ponds, and open-air seating. The cafe was intentionally designed to reflect the slower pace of Kaua'i mornings rather than the fast-moving atmosphere common in many tourist areas.

"Kaua'i works best when people slow down enough to actually notice where they are," Kirk says. "Some mornings we'll see guests sit with coffee for an hour just listening to birds in the garden. You don't really get that experience rushing from activity to activity."

That slower pace has become increasingly attractive to travelers seeking breaks from packed itineraries and overcrowded destinations.

Supporting Local Businesses Strengthens Communities

The cafe is also encouraging visitors to consider where they spend their money while traveling.

According to the American Independent Business Alliance, locally owned businesses recirculate significantly more revenue into local economies compared to large national chains. Small businesses also tend to support nearby suppliers, local employment, and community partnerships more directly.

Kiahuna Sunrise Cafe Hawaii sources locally roasted coffee and works with island-based pastry partners in its day-to-day operations.

"We try to keep the experience connected to Kaua'i whenever possible," Kirk explains. "The coffee comes from here. The setting is rooted in local history. Guests are getting something tied to the island instead of something they could find anywhere."

That connection matters because Hawaii continues balancing tourism growth with concerns about preserving local identity and community character.

Historic Spaces Help Travelers Understand Place

One of the more overlooked parts of travel, according to local business owners, is the importance of physical spaces themselves.

Kiahuna Sunrise Cafe Hawaii operates inside a plantation-era structure that had been closed since 2020 before restoration efforts brought it back into use. The building itself now becomes part of the visitor experience.

"We've had guests walk in and immediately start asking questions about the property and its history,"

Kirk says. “That conversation never starts if the building gets torn down and replaced with something generic.”

Historic preservation advocates across Hawaii have increasingly emphasized adaptive reuse projects to maintain cultural continuity while supporting economic activity.

According to the National Trust for Historic Preservation, heritage travelers often stay longer and spend more than average tourists because they seek experiences tied to local history and culture.

For visitors, spaces like Kiahuna Plantation offer a more grounded understanding of the island beyond beaches and resorts.

Travelers Are Prioritizing Experience Over Speed

Industry research continues to show a shift toward slower, more experience-focused travel habits.

A recent Expedia survey found that many travelers now prioritize meaningful local experiences over packed schedules and high-volume tourism activities. Restaurants, coffee shops, and neighborhood gathering places increasingly shape how travelers remember destinations.

That shift has become visible at Kiahuna Sunrise Cafe in Hawaii.

“We’ll have guests ask us where locals eat, where they should walk in the morning, or where they can find quieter parts of the island,” Kirk says. “People are looking for experiences that feel real to the place they’re visiting.”

The cafe’s location inside Kiahuna Plantation naturally encourages that slower rhythm. Guests often arrive early, stay longer than expected, and walk the surrounding grounds before heading out for the day.

Encouraging Visitors to Travel More Thoughtfully

Rather than criticizing tourism, Kiahuna Sunrise Cafe Hawaii is encouraging visitors to approach travel more intentionally.

That includes:

- Supporting local restaurants and coffee shops
- Visiting historic properties and cultural sites
- Spending time outside resort areas
- Slowing down schedules to experience local routines
- Learning about the history behind the places they visit

“These little choices shape how people experience Hawaii,” Kirk says. “You start to notice more when you stop trying to rush through everything.”

For Kaua’i businesses, that mindset helps create stronger connections between visitors and the local community.
