At the centre of the book is a deceptively simple shift in perspective. Childhood is temporary; adulthood is not. A child who is guided through school, friendships and family life will eventually have to make decisions independently, manage money, build relationships, choose a career, deal with failure and decide what kind of person to be when nobody is directing the next step.

Seen that way, academic achievement becomes only one part of preparation for life. Dasgupta’s framework brings together areas such as values, ethics and etiquette, personality development, creative and logical thinking, informal education, hobbies, financial literacy, career guidance and a global outlook.

The point is not to turn childhood into a development programme. It is to make parents conscious of the areas that can easily be left to chance while day-to-day life takes over.

Why call it an algorithm?

The title borrows a word more often associated with technology, but its use is deliberate. An algorithm suggests sequence, structure and progression. Dasgupta applies that idea to parenting as a way of thinking about how parental roles change as children grow.

This is not presented as a formula for producing a particular kind of child. Families differ, children differ, and circumstances change. The structure instead serves as a prompt: what does a child need at this stage, what will matter later, and what should a parent be paying attention to before a gap becomes difficult to correct?

The book gives particular attention to the formative years before sixteen, when the influence of home remains especially significant. Much of that influence is not delivered through formal lessons. It is absorbed through repetition.

The influence children see every day

A parent’s response to a disappointing result, the way money is discussed at home, how disagreement is handled, whether an apology is offered after a mistake, or how another person is treated can all communicate something to a child.

That makes parents influential in a way that is different from the creators, celebrities, and personalities children encounter online. Digital influence may be vast, but parental influence is close, repeated, and woven into ordinary life.

One of the book's strongest ideas is that children do not learn values only when adults speak about values. They also learn from watching adults make choices.

Parenting in a world shaped by screens

The digital environment gives this conversation new urgency. Recommendation systems, social feeds, games, short-form video, and online communities increasingly shape what young people encounter and how quickly they encounter it.

Parenting Algorithm does not treat technology as an enemy that can simply be removed from childhood. Its emphasis is on presence. A child's online life is still part of the environment in which that child is developing, and parental engagement cannot stop at the edge of a screen.

For families, that means moving the conversation beyond the number of hours spent online. What children are consuming, how they interpret it, whom they trust, and what behaviours are being normalised can matter just as much.

Development beyond the report card

The book also challenges the tendency to use academic performance as the dominant measure of whether a child is doing well.

An excellent report card cannot, by itself, show whether a young person understands money, can reason through a difficult decision, has developed interests beyond formal education, can communicate across cultures or knows how to respond when a carefully made plan fails.

Schools, tutors, coaches and specialists can support many of these areas. Dasgupta nevertheless draws a useful distinction between delegating an activity and delegating responsibility. Parents may seek expert help, but they still have to notice whether an experience is genuinely helping the child grow or simply filling another slot in the calendar.

Built to be used, not simply read

The presentation of *Parenting Algorithm – Nurturing Tomorrow's Adults* reflects that practical intent. The full-colour book uses illustrations, diagrams and visual explanations rather than relying only on long blocks of conventional text.

That matters because parenting questions rarely arrive in a neat sequence. They surface in the middle of a disagreement, a school transition, a difficult decision or an unexpected conversation. What parents can control more deliberately is the attention they bring to their own role.

That is ultimately the proposition behind *Parenting Algorithm*: parenting does not need to become mechanical to become more intentional. The everyday choices made at home — often the ones that feel too small to matter — can accumulate into the habits, expectations and values a child carries forward.
